We **OPPOSED** HB 26 - This bill expands the list of accepted forms of identification to be presented when

voting. Currently, although there is a list of accepted IDs, no ID is required to vote. Any registered voter who

arrives at a polling location without an accepted form of identification, or with no ID at all, can sign a statement

ELECTIONS

We OPPOSED HB 441 - This bill expands the practice of curbside voting to not only individuals with a physical impairment but also those who have a mental impairment; this could significantly increase the use of curbside voting. When used at all, we believe the best practice is for curbside voting to be available only for individuals who need physical accommodations. - PASSED

The original text of this bill would have also prohibited a firearm in a vehicle that was within 100 feet of a voting location, but the bill was amended to eliminate that problem. - **VOTE DELAYED**

We OPPOSED HB 1408 - This bill takes a top-down approach to determining the appropriate number of early voting locations in each Virginia city and county, by directing the Department of Elections to create guidelines for localities to utilize regarding how many early voting locations should be open for early voting.
